

# Aging Water Meters

- · There are approximately 1,400 water meters on our system.
- Residential meters currently installed from three different manufacturers:
  - Badger
  - Rockwell
  - Sensus
- The majority of the meters in the field are over 30 years old

# Visible Revenue Reduction

- · In 2006, Mine Hill Township billed for 76,808,903 gallons of water.
- · In 2011, Mine Hill Township billed for 64,334,983 gallons of water.
- Drop of 16% over this 5 year period even with additions to the system!

### Meter Problems

- - As the meter ages, the nutating disk (like a water wheel) inside the meter body wears down
    If the water draw inside a home is low (leaky faucet or
  - toilet) it will not be detected by the meter
- Readings
  - Missed reads
  - Wrong reads
  - Low reads
  - Estimates
  - Meter tampering

# New Metering System

- Radio Read Meters
  - Eliminate estimated reads
  - Immediately detect tampering
  - Capture accurate water use
  - Moves technician to a pro-active partner in data collection and problem solving
  - State guidelines for water loss
  - Federal water lead level guidelines



- The most recent deployment of "new" meters was 15+ years ago.
  - Canfield Ave.
  - · Valley View Drive
  - · Janet Drive
  - · Edith Place
  - Allen Lane
- · Scattered installation of new meters as required when old ones begin to leak or just give out.

  - Approximately 12 per year
     180 meters in the last 15 years (12 %)

# Metering Water

- · Positive Displacement Meters
  - Water runs into the meter through a chamber (known amount) and out of the meter into the home
  - Spins a dial like a car's odometer to capture water usage for us to read

### Recommendations

- 1. Finalize repairs to items listed in leak detection report.
- 2. Replacing water meters will achieve:
  - Capture more accurate usage.
     Read every meter, every time.

  - Detect leaks in home earlier, avoiding water loss.
  - Cover labor costs by reducing time spent in field reading meters.
     Streamline billing allowing time for more in-depth analysis of accounts.

  - Reduce water theft.

# Replacement Process

- · Oldest meters first!
  - Identify replacements block by block
  - Or hire a contractor to replace ALL the meters in 4-8 weeks
- · Communicate to homeowners the need for personal compliance to existing Ordinances regarding:
  - Internal shut off in place
  - Pressure reducing valve in place

# Potential Expense

### TOWNSHIP

- Meter cost?
- Additional manpower to complete project in a timely fashion
- Plumber on standby for repairs if needed

### HOMEOWNER

- · Meter cost?
- Bring existing plumbing to current standards.

# Estimated costs for 1400 Meter replacements

- Approximately \$215.00 per meter.
- Approximately \$60.00 \$75.00 per meter to install by outside vendor
- \$275.00 to \$290.00 per meter installed
- Total project cost \$406,000.00
- · Miscellaneous expenses \$25,000.00 "ish"
- · Estimated 2 1/2 3 year debt elimination
- \$430,000 divided by \$162,000 = <u>2.75 years</u>

# Benefits and Results of this Project

- Reduce water loss below 10% to meet State guidelines.
- Eliminate need to borrow money to balance Water Utility Budget
- Reduce Water department labor by 32 FTE days annually through electronic reading of meters
- Maintain our infrastructure in a more budgetary & environmentally friendly way.

# How do we pay for it?!

- · Bond for entire project
- Lease to own option Lease the cost of paying for the meters and installation

Financially creative mechanism that allows for quicker payoff of the financing thereby reducing the cost of the money to the Water Utility

Well-water users are not part of any of this discussion

## Putting the plan in action

- Send out notices to all property owners on affected street advising them that they should bring the home to standards
- Have vendor change out every meter within 8 weeks which will increase savings immediately instead of a slow roll-out method
- Penalize homeowners who are noncompliant.
